We have been many places ourselves since this union many together and some apart, such as Nowra, Melbourne for Aerospace Engineering studies, Christmas Island, Persian Gulf twice on operations, designed and built a house at Murwillumbah while I was away. God has blessed my life so much and some of the sacrifice and hardship, truly makes you appreciate how lucky we are in Australia.

My CMA beginnings were about 3 years after joining the Navy, this funny grey bearded old bloke called Roy who was a member of our church at that time encouraged me to come along on a couple of rides, and boy he could ride! I learnt a lot from him in the art of bikerness and all

Hugh O'Dempsey sealed the deal and I attended many rides before he handed over the job of area coordinator to me a few years back.

How do you measure the success of an organization – is it purely fiscal or is it by its merits, is it by its size or the way the people are? All of these are factors and as the Treasurer I am able to report on a couple of these aspects objectively and the others, well I will have to be subjective.

The last couple of months has seen CMA impacting lives through contributions to causes. Each of you has contributed to this through membership fees, merchandise sales and attendance at the National last year. We have donated;

- \$500 to the Blue Ribbon Motorcycle Ride for Prostate Cancer Research
- \$500 to Mobile Mission Maintenance to help them recover from equipment lost through the Victorian Bushfires
- \$1000 to Chaplaincy Australia to support the placement of a chaplain in a fire affected town in Victoria for 18 months
- \$1500 to TEAR Australia to fund the installation of a well to enable a village to have fresh water.

With the first three donations these directly impact some of our members as these are organizations that they work with or have been impacted by, the well is seen as symbolic as we are now providing living water to a entire community.

Numbers wise we have 45 financial memberships (over 65 people) and nine of those have joined this year. There are another 36 who have IOU's on this years fees so they will be doubly blessing me in the months to come;)

But above and beyond all of this is the human factor – do you pine when you haven't been out with your fellow CMA'ers, does sharing in an outreach lift your heart, did you shed a tear when you heard of another's struggles – for most of you I know the answer to these is yes and therein lies our strength. We may moan about the tyranny of distance or that there are some of you who do not ride Suzuki's, we all go to different churches and have different livelihoods – but we come together as one body, our diversification brings unification – brothers and sisters without any sibling rivalry (which in itself is a form of heaven). I am reminded of Ecc 4:12 where it talks of a single man can be easily overcome, two can withstand but a braided cord cannot easily be broken – you & I intertwined with Christ will not be overcome! In this lies the strength of CMA.

Be blessed as you go forth in His name and please keep the rubber side down!

Is there anything we can do to lose that feeling of being alone?


